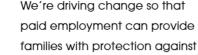

## What have we done?

We have worked with...



 Conducted interviews over three years with workers across
 Scotland in diverse roles to gather insight into their experiences.



Led workshops with business owners and managers to explore operational challenges, promote discussion, and encourage crossorganisational sharing of good practices.



Facilitated sessions with the Hospitality Skills Group (part of the ILG) to identify key challenges and future opportunities for the sector, and how we can prepare.

### What have we found?

#### Some of our key findings ...

- Many workers have left the hospitality sector. Those who remain often cite factors such as career development opportunities, access to training, and supportive management as key reasons for staying.
- Many workers expressed a desire for more training and support but were unsure where to find it.
- Employers are time-constrained and face multiple pressures—e.g. cost of living crisis, Brexit, COVID-19.
   Despite these challenges, many are committed to creating supportive environments and providing development opportunities for their staff.
- Perception that hospitality roles are not "real jobs" or viable long-term careers in the UK.
- Low awareness within the sector of the range of charities and support organisations available to help both employers and employees.
